### SHARE THE BLESSINGS: A VOLUNTEER ORGANIZATION

Until recently, Share The Blessings (STB) Board was both the "Board and the Organization" since we had no other members *on board!* Initially this was not a problem given our original goal of providing just 2 clean water wells and helping a few students with their education.

Later, however, as we became more aware of the immensity of the need, we redefined as well as broadened our goals and focused more on **Education** and **Clean Water**. Within a very short time, the education program had grown to an astounding 50-student program! In fact today we are sponsoring 57 of them.

Even with such an unforeseen rapid growth, our Board alone was still the legs and arms of the Organization, doing all the work. But soon the challenge grew so enormous that the Board could no longer continue to be the Board as well as the Organization.

So, in 2008, we decided to reorganize ourselves, creating, in the process, a Volunteer Organization that did not only include all the Board members, but incorporated new volunteers. Without such a move, we were risking "burn out" since all Board members were in fact volunteers holding regular jobs in addition to serving Share The Blessings. But such re-organization did not pass without other internal adjustments.

After our first fundraising dinner in 2007, we filled our Education Chair position with a volunteer who wasn't on the Board. We also held a retreat in 2008 to focus on our Organizational structure. These two changes proved very fruitful and put us on the course to expanding our volunteer base. It is no wonder that

our 2009 fundraising dinner volunteers were not only led by a non-Board volunteer, but non-Board volunteers out numbered Board volunteers and the dinner was a huge success. It was because of this spirit of volunteerism that "a major contributor" rewarded our efforts by more than matching our 2009 dinner proceeds!

And consequently, we have turned even yet another primary chair position - Clean Water - from a Board member volunteer to a non-Board member volunteer, in addition to opening up other key volunteer positions. ## FR. JOE'S STORY

Many people ask me why I am so actively engaged with children sponsorship. My answer is a simple.

When I was a small boy in Primary 3, the Pastor of our home Parish visited my home. Instead of talking to our parents, he spent most of his time playing with us [children], and teaching us some games. He was very nice and kind! When he left, I said to my dad, 'I want to be like that man'. 'He is a priest,' my dad informed me. Then he told me what

priests do. 'I would like to be like that priest,' I confirmed.

Unfortunately before I could join the seminary to train for the priesthood, my dad died - on February 19, 1972. I was in Primary Six. We were left six children with our mother who did not have a job. On completing the Primary School the following

year, because there was no body to take me to the seminary, the headmaster of our school asked me to repeat Primary Seven class, even though I had passed my Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) very well.

I repeated, and again I passed very well. Still

there was no one to take me to the seminary.
The same head teacher asked me to repeat
P.7! Because I was really doing nothing, I
repeated, and once more, I passed very well.
But again no one could take me to the seminary! It was only with greatest difficulty that
the head teacher managed to convince me
to repeat P.7 a third time. After sitting PLE
four consecutive times, each time passing
very well but finding no one to take me to

the seminary, I gave up and started gardening. The head teacher too gave up!

Just then, something happened. One day, when I was in the garden picking coffee, my mother called me and told me that there was somebody who wanted to see me. When I got home, I met a gentleman called Silas Kasule who asked me, 'Are you the boy who want to be a priest?' 'Yes, I am,' I replied. 'Go and pack up, I am taking you to the Seminary,' he said. Overwhelmed, I ran into the house and started to dance.



But I had nothing to pack up: so I only changed clothes and came out.

Mr. Silas Kasule took me to his home in Kampala., the capital of Uganda, and bought for me all that I needed to join the Seminary. The following Monday he took me to the Seminary, and now I am a priest.

## Let Clean Waters Flow

"At the time when Yahweh God made earth and heaven,... Yahweh God had not sent rain upon the earth ... Instead water flowed out of the ground and watered all the surface of the earth." (Gen,2:4-6)

During Share The Blessings' first years of operation, many people in the early village sites did not believe that the wells would really be completed. They thought they would be started and left incomplete. This skepticism might partly have been due to their experience with other Non-Governmental Organization Projects that had operated in these villages before. Or, perhaps, the very work of digging a well seemed too expensive that they didn't believe Share The Blessings would be able to fund the whole work from start to finish.

However, these people have constantly been surprised not only by Share The Blessings' resolve to complete started wells but also by the ability to continue digging ever new wells!! The skepticism has completely been erased; indeed replaced by surprise, confidence and trust as Share The Blessings has determinedly dug, completed and commissioned a total of 13 wells, in addition to having already sent in funds for a 14th well. In fact we are soon sending funds for the 15th well *as well* -

only waiting for logistical information from Uganda before we do so!

The wells cost anywhere from \$5,000 to \$10,000 (US dollars). It depends on how deep it needs to be dug to tap into the water-table. If the Ugandan company that we use to dig these wells needs to bring in heavy equipment to

drill the well, it obviously costs considerably more. Fortunately, though, most of the wells we have commissioned have not required the use of heavy equipment. This has helped us enormously to save for more wells. Moreover, in this water program, we have been blessed with the help of seminarians. They have been our folks on the ground (meeting with villagers, teaching them how to maintain the wells, checking on the status of the wells, and helping us to find the next well site). Their assistance and support helps us also save more.

Recently we have also been blessed with a new chair of the Water Committee: Mr. Agata Bonaventure. Bonaventure, originally from Kenya, is well experienced with water projects and has worked with a number of Non-Governmental Organizations before. His leadership will not only help Share The Blessings grow, but his experience will make the Water program thrive.
